

South Carolina Greenville District June the 28 1846 Dear Sister I now embrace the present opportunity of writing to you to inform you that we are all well at present hoping that these lines may find you all enjoying good blessing We have nothing of importance to communicate to you at present only times are hard here that is Money, is, scarce and hard to get and provisions are very scarce here this year especially Corn. upon the account of the drouth we had here last year. Corn has been selling from 80 Cts to one Dollar per Bushel Wheat at \$1.00 per bushel bacon from 8 to ten cts per pound There has been tolerably good crops of wheat made here this year the rust and flies has injured the wheat crops a good. Our present crops are corn and cotton and another grain looks very promising if we have good seasons we will make good crops We received your letter dated May the tenth June the 22 which give us exceeding great satisfaction to heare from you all that you were well. The check that John Wind sent I recd it and sould it for 98 Dollars and as I cant write I tould Gastine Terry to write you an answer which he promise to do but whether he did or not I cant tell but I suppose that he did. The widow Martin has had a child and swore it to James Woodsides/

We now proseed to give a list of our family we have 8 in family six boy and two girls And when I look arround upon my boys and see them all playing about I am made to think that if they were a little larger I could take them and upset the Mexican Government, And as for Elizabeth she is the same old ra six now that she ever was as funny and lively nowe as she ever was Our youngest Cild was bornd Sept the 5 2845 and his name is Charles Edwin. Wind requested in the letter he sent me that he wanted to know whare Thomas Terry's widow and family are living so far as I have been able to ascertain they are liveing in Decalb County in Georgia and if you wish to write to them you had better direct your letter to Decator Court House. You wrote in your letter that you wanted to know when we had heard from William Terry I hant had a letter from him since last fall he was then verry much dissatisfied but he has sence become to be very well satisfied, and has bought land and settled himself. We have heard from him a few weekes ago and he and family were well then, but he has had a great deal of sickness in his family he wrote to me that the light never was out of his House for nine weeks in successian. Mahala says that she never knowed what trouble was before she said that they make plenty there to eat but had no stomach to eat it All of the cannections that are liveing here are well as fare as I know. All of the cannections in Mississippi were well a few weeks ago when we heard from there. Mahala has anather Daughter sence she left here. John Mcelroy has lost his Wife sence he move to Mississippi. The people has got in a desperate way of marrying there has been severral weddings in iseland this year. Willson Mcelroy was married the twenty fifth of this inst to Miss Marry Alexander the young Esq Daughter Sarah the next time you write us a letter dont forget to sign your name to it as we may know who is writeing to us Margriet we have not forgot you yet but still remember you and think it is high time that you were married.
